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

PRESIDENT'S FOREWORD

The last 3 years has been very difficult and challenging for all of us, and yet, it gives me great honour and pleasure to present a consolidated Three Year Annual Report (2020 – 2022) of the Federation. It must be noted that Annual Reports for 2020 and 2021 were not prepared due to other priorities and staff constraint.

After the onslaught of COVID-19 pandemic in 2020 that almost paralysed the country, we found new ways to adapt and reach out to the people who needed our services and voices even more during the pandemic than at any other time in the history of the Federation. The people who needed our services the most include the marginalized populations such as the refugee community, sex workers, transsexuals and marginalized youth. As the Movement Control Orders (MCOs) were eased, our initial thoughts throughout the ensuing years were our services would gradually increase and life would return to normalcy. But, however, it seems that Covid-19 is here to stay as the virus progresses from pandemic to endemic. Our expectation was that the pent-up demand for services would increase quickly post-Covid-19 but in reality the recovery was very slow and gradual.

Despite the inhibitions of our clients for fear of contracting the virus, our service providers took all the necessary precautions to protect the clients and themselves as well as restrategised channels of reaching our clients in more efficient ways- through telephones, social media, and even home visits.

At the Triennial Delegates Conference in December 2020, new council members were elected at a time when COVID-19 pandemic was at its peak. Although it is belated, I congratulate delegates elected as Principal office-bearers for the 3 year term 2020 – 2022. I also take this opportunity to thank the delegates for reelecting me as the President of FRHAM for another term.

The year 2022, was a landmark year in the Family Planning movement as the International Conference on Family Planning (ICFP) held in Pattaya, Thailand attended by staff and volunteers of FRHAM with the theme 'Family Planning and Universal Health Coverage: Innovate. Collaborate. Accelarate' emphasized the importance of the accessibility to family planning and reproductive health services as a critical component of a country's economic health.

The other significant event in 2022 on the international front, that FRHAM participated was the 'IPPF Global Youth Forum and General Assembly' held in Bogota, Columbia which discussed a variety of important issues related to youth sexual and reproductive health and rights in relation to IPPF Strategic Framework 2023-2028. The Youth Forum established IPPF's commitment to advancing SRHR for all, especially youth and marginalized groups. FRHAM will 'toe the line' by developing plans for its Youth Committee in 2023 conforming to the Youth Forum's recommendations.

PRESIDENT'S FOREWORD

At the regional level, we participated in several workshops in 2022 such as the IPPF Workshop on Data Management Strategy (DMS). This workshop set the principles for data management for the MAs in the region and it serves as a guide to support the New Strategic Framework (2023-2028) by ensuring the data is utilised for programme management, resource allocation, justification to potential funders, evaluation and knowledge management. The other significant regional workshop that FRHAM participated include the IPPF Youth Workshop in Manila. This workshop emphasized on a youth centered and youth-led to SRHR, strengthening engagement and innovative approaches to youth programming.

Besides the above workshops, FRHAM also participated in the IPPF ESEAOR Regional Quality of Care (QoC) workshop in Cambodia where a deeper understanding of IPPF quality of care framework and its implementation steps were discussed to be utilised for the 3 year business plan (2023 - 2025). This workshop emphasized the importance of continuously maintaining a high quality SRH services by utilizing the principles, process and tools established by IPPF for good programme management in identifying gaps and root causes to ensure continuous quality improvement.

The year 2022 was yet another significant year as it was the last year of the FRHAM National Strategic Framework (2020 – 2022) and the roll out of the IPPF Strategy 2028 which is the New Strategic Framework (2023 – 2028) for the next six years. It sets out a familiar path but in a new direction in view of the tough challenges that must be confronted in the years ahead. The strategy is based on the collective contributions of everyone who came together to shape it as the emphasis is on coming together and leaving no one behind.

I would like to express my gratitude to IPPF, our primary donor, for their unwavering financial and technical support and guidance over the years. I would also like to express my sincere appreciation to the government, including the National Population and Family Development Board which is part of the Ministry of Women, Family and Community Development, the Ministry of Health, and the Ministry of Education. I also extend my appreciation to our partner NGOs, such as the, Malaysian AIDS Council (MAC), the Reproductive Rights Alliance and Advocacy Malaysia (RRAAM), the Malaysian Council for Child Welfare (MCCW), the Asian-Pacific Resource & Research Centre for Women (ARROW). National Council of Welfare and Social Development (NCWSD) and the National Council of Women's Organization (NCWO).

In conclusion, I would like to thank all the staff and volunteers, from both State MAs and FRHAM Secretariat for their dedication and commitment for having fulfilled the goals, objectives and targets of the FRHAM National Strategic Framework (2016-2022) and putting their heart and soul in the preparation of the New Strategic Framework (2023 – 2028) which emphasizes on the 4 pillars and 12 pathways.

CHAIRPERSON'S MESSAGE



DR KAMAL KENNY SARAVANAN

I would like to begin by stating that Covid-19 pandemic has affected almost all countries and more than 50 million people around the world. Governments were operating in the context of radical uncertainty, and faced with difficult tradeoffs given the health, economic and social challenges it raises. By the early 2020, more than half of the world's population had experienced lockdowns with strong movement measures. Beyond the health and human tragedy of the coronavirus, it is now widely recognised that the pandemic triggered the most serious economic crisis. As a consequence of this scenario, we were severely affected adapting to new approaches to transition from our comfort zone where we can make the most impact in our work as well as continually making ourselves relevant and adept in the new pandemic era.

As playing fields are constantly being redefined according to the global situation at hand, it has not stopped us from finding new ways to make sure that our services reach out to the vulnerable, underserved and marginalized as it is our commitment to meet their needs. This is a big challenge for FRHAM as it strives to optimize resources in the context of reduced and limited funding.

In 2021, the pandemic entered its second year filled with uncertainties and challenges, but we remained committed to place our stakeholders' interests and needs above all guided by our mission to improve the status of sexual and reproductive health in Malaysia within a strong and resilient family system.

Moreover, we appreciate the government's willingness to address issues affecting Malaysia's youth, given that they make up a third of the population and that we require a cohesive, focused national approach to address concerns that had been lingering for years. We uphold IPPF's policy in engaging youths in the Federation's leadership roles as voices of the youth which is enshrined in our Constitution as well as their engagement in leading their own SRHR agenda.

In line with the objectives to enable young people to receive comprehensive sexuality education, FRHAM have received a grant to implement a project known as 'Differentiated HIV Services for Key Population (DHSKP)' - Men who have sex with Men (MSM) which is a three-year project initiated by the Malaysian AIDS Council with funding from The Global Fund, for an initial period of one year (July 2022 to Jun 2023), with the provision of grant continuation based on performance. This project aims to increase testing coverage and treatment initiation among MSM while at the same time increasing the coverage of package services for MSM.

Besides the above project, FRHAM and the State MAs participated in several projects. These include the SRHR project for the displaced community funded by the Japan Trust Fund, Gender Equality Campaign project launched by FRHAM as a beneficiary of Gucci's Chime for Change, Project on Information, Education, Knowledge on HIV for young people funded by Gilead Foundation, Research project on 'Understanding Pathways to Adolescent Pregnancy' funded by UNFPA/Burnet Research Institute.

CHAIRPERSON'S MESSAGE

In terms of challenges, I foresee the need to revive and improve the Secretariat knowledge on effective mechanisms for Coordination, Training, Monitoring and Evaluation as well as to improve the lines of communication. The Secretariat besides allocating resources to the State MAs has to effectively play the role as the nerve centre in the provision of technical assistance and source of information.

I wish to put on record my sincere appreciation to the various donors, particularly IPPF and other partner organizations be it Government Organisations (GOs) or Non-Government Organisations (NGOs) in enabling FRHAM to remain relevant and continue to spearhead the organization to greater heights even during turbulent times and in the future.

I thank the outgoing Executive Directors Ms Syirin Junisya and Ms Nora Murat, the Head of Administration and Finance Ms Li-Lina Wu and the Head of Programmes and Projects Ms Mehalah Lingam for their dedication and commitment to the organization in carrying out their work diligently towards achieving the vision and mission of the organization.

I also would like to appreciate the perseverance and determination of our volunteers for their contribution towards achieving the objectives of FRHAM's National strategic Framework. I must also thank the dedicated staff of State MAs and the FRHAM Secretariat, who have been tirelessly working continuously and creating strategic partnerships to enable our outcomes and objectives are met. Last but not least, I would like to take this opportunity to thank my fellow Principal Office-Bearers for their unstinting commitment and support.

HONORARY SECRETARY-GENERAL'S REPORT

Covid-19 had a profound negative impact on the economy, including the government, nongovernment, and corporate sectors. FRHAM and its 13 State Member Associations were not spared, but they remained resilient and carried out the programmes as planned for the last three years, from 2020 to 2022. Towards the end of this period, it is reassuring to see that the severity of the pandemic has begun to decline as a result of the government's extensive vaccination rollout. FRHAM continued to promote and deliver family planning and SRH services during these years, while also advocating for and promoting SRHR education to women, men, youth, and marginalized communities. With the commencement of the pandemic, and subsequent Movement Control Orders (MCOs), employees adapted to working from home by eliminating the need to commute to work, facilitating convenience, saving time, and flexibility, and therefore fostering improved work-life balance.

The ongoing support of our funders and partner organizations, as well as the dedication and ingenuity of volunteers and staff, enabled us to carry out all planned projects and deliver services in accordance with the four outcomes established in the National Strategic Framework (2016-2022).

Outcome 1: Policies and Programmes That Respect, Project and Fulfill SRHR and Gender Equality is Implemented

As part of implementing a country monitoring project to review the status of the Convention on the Elimination of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW) and the adoption of the Gender Equality Act, FRHAM participated in a workshop on Gender Equality Sustainability plan organized by the Asia-Pacific Resource and Research Center for Women (ARROW). The workshop evaluated the project achievements and taking this into consideration, FRHAM developed the way forward through a sustainability plan on advocacy and public support for gender equality in fulfilling its SRHR agenda.

We are curious in our efforts to strengthen FRHAM's visibility through tie-ups with a variety of partners, and in this instance, we are grateful for the collaboration with Global Impress in The Gender Equality Campaign's project launched by FRHAM as a beneficiary of Gucci's Chime for Change, a global campaign initiated by Gucci to convince, unite and strengthen voices advocating for gender equality. The Campaign, in keeping with the spirit of Gucci's Chime for Change, focuses on raising awareness, amplifying voices, and connecting the public with various organizations working to achieve gender equality in Malaysia. Under the Gender Equality campaign, FRHAM has released one talk show on the facebook page of 'Speak Up Malaysia'.

HONORARY SECRETARY-GENERAL'S REPORT

Outcome 2: People in Malaysia are fully informed and empowered to act on SRH and Rights

In order to enable young people to receive comprehensive sexuality education, FRHAM and the State MAs have reached out to young people through talks, forums, training, campaigns, workshops using the Reproductive Health Adolescent Module (RHAM).

In addition, FRHAM and the State MAs partnered and collaborated with several Government Organisations (GOs) and Non-Government Organisations (NGOs) to provide CSE and SRHR services to young people. A total of 10,492 young people below the age 24 received services through our service delivery network.

Each year, FRHAM expanded its networks on a wider coverage to empower people in Malaysia on SRH & Rights. The Communication and Digital Campaign to Reproductive Promote Sexual Health information to Young People is one of the projects that FRHAM continuously worked on in 2022. Funded by UNICEF, it is "Let's Talk Sex" with the goal of empowering youth to make informed reproductive health decisions, especially for young people at the age between 13 to 24 years and parents as the target audiences. Although the project has been completed at the end of 2021, it is still being sustained as there is still a massive unmet need.

Outcome 3: Provision of quality and integrated SRHR services accessible by all especially the marginalized and the underserved

FRHAM and the State MAs delivered a comprehensive SRHR services through its network of 25 static clinics, 222 mobile/outreach clinics and 139 COMCEFP outlets which include 119 doctors and 20 paramedics. Besides the provision of contraceptive services, the types of non-contraceptive services include gynaecological services, obstetric services, HIV/AIDS services, STI/RTI services, urology services, abortion services, subfertility services as well as non-SRH services including management of non-communicable diseases such as diabetes and hypertension.

Through the IPPF Japan Trust Fund (JTF), FRHAM successfully implemented a project in safeguarding the SRHR needs of the displaced persons from Rakhine state in Malaysia which is extended and ongoing. The project had created an impact on the marginalized community in creating awareness and empowering them through an enabling environment on the need for SRH services. The SMAs of Kedah, Kelantan, Melaka, Penang, Perlis and Selangor participated in the project. FRHAM partnered with several NGOs such as Tzu Chi Foundation and Mercy Malaysia to provide the necessary SRH education, awareness and services.

In serving the marginalized, FRHAM implemented the Differentiated HIV Services for Key Populations (DHSKP) project for female sex workers and women at risk as well as for Men having Sex with Men (MSM) in partnership with Malaysian AIDS council. This project has reached out to 1260 high risk online clients both men and women and provided 299 face-to-face contacts as well as 182 HIV/AIDS tests.

To provide preventative information and knowledge, education and awareness to young people on HIV a project funded by Gilead Foundation was implemented. This project was participated by FRHAM, Kelantan, Pahang and Terengganu. The project conducted 523 awareness sessions, trained 300 trainer of trainers and conducted 544 youth sessions.

Outcome 4: A high performing, visible and accountable FRHAM

FRHAM has been featured in the online and news media on several occasions. Specific mention is to be made of the following which was highlighted in the media: launching of a new brand of condom known as 'Wonderleaf', participation in World AIDS Day as well as opinion of the Chairperson of FRHAM in the news media on children's mental health during Covid-19.

HONORARY SECRETARY-GENERAL'S REPORT

Besides contributing to the outcomes of the National Strategic Framework (2016 – 2022) through various planned projects, the year 2022 was rather a busy year for FRHAM Secretariat and State MAs as they were preparing for the New Strategic Framework (2023 – 2028). The mechanism included FRHAM conducting a Strategic Framework and 3 year Business Plan (2023 – 2025) workshop participated by the SMAs. In addition, several virtual meetings were held with the State MAs to provide the necessary inputs for the development of their individual plans.

To provide long term visibility to the organization, FRHAM undertook a research project funded by UNFPA/Burnet Research Institute on 'Understanding Pathways to Adolescent Pregnancy in Southeast Asia' The research identified the causes that lead to intended and unintended adolescent pregnancy as a consequence of early marriage which will be useful in the development of appropriate programme related policy and recommendations to effectively address adolescent pregnancy. A dissemination seminar is scheduled in 2023 in collaboration with key country stakeholders including government, non-government and UN agencies to demonstrate the relevance and visibility of the organization.

Furthermore, in order to reflect visibility and highlight the organization's work, FRHAM will continuously strive to update its website with current ongoing events, highlighting partnerships with like-minded organizations, and serving as a vehicle for networking with our existing and new partners and donors.

Service Statistics

In the last three years from 2020-2022, we served 178,279 clients (2020-59,758, 2021-62,828, 2022-55,723) including women, men and young people from urban, suburban, poor and vulnerable communities. Female clients comprise 97% in 2020, 93.6% in 2021 and 92.0% in 2022 of the total clients served. The average number of young people client below 24 years of age was 5.6% (2020- 8.0%, 2021-5.4%, 2022 - 4.2%) of the total clients. On the other hand, clients from poor and vulnerable communities comprises of 17.2% in 2020, 17.3% in 2021 and 12.2 in 2022.

A total of 854,625 services (2020-242,207, 2021-267,405, 2022-316,173) were provided, comprising 357,972 non-SRH services, 307,517 non-contraceptive services and 160,296 contraceptive services. General contraceptive counseling formed 38.8% of the total contraceptive services, followed by 37.5% oral contraceptive services.

Finally, I would like to express my sincere thanks to my fellow volunteers, the Principal office-bearers and all staff both at FRHAM and State MAs for their hard work, commitment and loyalty.



FRHAM collaborated with Autrui Global to conduct CSE and outreach sessions to Rohingya community at Madrasah Abu Bakr Sidik, Ampang



Penang FHDA, together with Malaysian Pharmaceutical Society (MPS) Penang and MPS Young Pharmacists Chapter (MPSYPC) Penang together with Malaysian Community Pharmacy Guild (MCPG), organised a workshop on "Advancing Pharmacists' Role - Myths and Facts about Sexual Health and Family Planning Workshop" in conjunction with MCPG's 15th annual general meeting (AGM) for its fellow health care professionals.

This 1-day interactive workshop was attended by about 200 pharmacists which was aimed to empower pharmacists to help men and women take control of their own reproductive health and family planning. With increased knowledge in sexual education and reproductive health, including contraceptive pill counselling, men's health and comorbidities, family planning etc, pharmacists and allied health professionals can increase role in disseminating accurate information about sexual health to the community.

Training for Service Providers (Reproductive Health Association of Kelantan, ReHAK)

ReHAK, with the support from Ministry of Health through their grant for mental health, has conducted a series of training for service providers on the Prevention of Intimate Partner Violence (IPV) -Emotional/Psychological Violence. Among the service providers involved in the training were PDRM and health service providers (JKN, hospital and clinics). The training aimed to enhance understanding of intimate partner violence, particularly emotional/psychological violence, identify the multiagency latest practices in handling IPV cases and to discuss the referral pathways for IPV as well as administrative data management.

Gender Equality Initiative

But not many know where to go and how to exercise for their rights to be fulfilled, and engaging with policymakers to sensitise them to create an enabling environment for these women and girls in pursuing these rights, and obtain gender equality in society. Meaningful Adolescent and Youth Engagement (MAYE)

FRHAM has endorsed the Global Consensus Statement on Meaningful Adolescent and Youth Engagement (MAYE), signalling their commitment and intention to improve MAYE. At the launch of the Statement in November 2018, they were join along 250+ signatories (organizations, agencies, companies, governments and others) in to respond to this global initiative in promoting MAYE and collectively improve the partnership with young people with the aspiration to accelerate efforts to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals.

This consensus highlights the importance of sexual and reproductive health and right to young people in order to allow them to be empowered to make informed choice in pertaining to their health, well-being, and life.

Together with their partners individuals who endorsed the document, they are working hand in hand in providing a more enabling environment for the younger generation in reducing adolescent pregnancies', upholding their rights to sexual and reproductive health





Gender Equality Initiative (Reproductive Health Association of Kelantan, ReHAK)

ReHAK also collaborated with the Asian-Pacific Resource and Research Center for Women (ARROW) in implementing the Gender Equality Initiative (GEI) under the project 'Grounding Human Rights in Malaysia for All: Embracing Change'. The project aimed to support the realization of the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW) and the Universal Periodic Review (UPR). The project was funded through European Instrument for Democracy and Human Rights (EIDHR). The main objective of the project was to build capacity of local CSOs/NGOs in Kelantan in the implementation of the relevant CEDAW and UPR within the human rights framework to achieve gender equality.

The workshop aimed to increase awareness of adolescent sexual and reproductive health and rights and gender equality, initiate the process of encouraging youth involvement and develop capacity to advocate in youth sexual and reproductive health issues as well as to shift their mindset regarding gender equality. Among the topics covered in the workshop was concept of rights, child marriage, gender equality, menstrual health and mental health. Overall, the participants showed an increase knowledge in SRHR.

Through the project, ReHAK abled to conduct two capacity building consultations meeting with young girls and CSOs/NGOs, respectively. A few issues have emerged from those two consultation meetings such as child marriage, menstrual health, gender equality, rights, violence against women, Covid-19 situation among women in terms of economy and unemployment issues, mental health as well as SRH issues among disable persons. The consultation meetings were then followed by the Capacity Building Workshop with Young Girls and CSOs/NGOs, which were conducted separately. For the Capacity Building Workshop with Young Girls, a total of 20 young girls aged 15 – 24 years old attended the workshop.

IPPF Global Youth Forum and General Assembly

The 2022 IPPF Global Youth Forum and General Assembly was held in Bogota, Colombia from November 21-25 in Grand Hyatt Hotel. The delegates coming from different parts of the world discussed a variety of important issues related to youth sexual and reproductive health and rights and IPPF 2023-2028 strategic plan. FRHAM was represented by Ms Wong Li Xin, Chair person, Youth Committee.

IPPF Global Youth Forum

IPPF Global Youth Forum was a 1-day event focused on revising youth resolution and recommending actions to the General Assembly.

Seven resolutions pertaining to youth was made as follows:

- Committing to a meaningful youth IPPF strategy
- Ensuring youth involvement in the IPPF rebranding process
- Prioritizing core funding for youth-related projects
- Building capacity within governance structures
- Creating a global platform for youth to connect and share
- Ensuring that Member Associations are safe spaces for youth
- Creating a mentorship program for intergenerational growth



Comprehensive Sexuality Education (CSE)

Information, Education and communication (IEC) programme/activities play a vital role in complementing the various program strategies of Sabah FPA. Provision of up-to-date and accurate information is an effective way to disseminate information and messages to mobilize support for sexual and reproductive health and rights.









Sabah FPA implemented several webinars on sexual reproductive health and rights related topics from year 2021 until year 2022. The first Webinar Program Kesedaran: Kesejahteraan dan Kesihatan Komuniti Wanita supported by Sabah Council of Social Services, was implemented in several series from April until June 2021. Another few series of Webinar Program Kesejahteraan Keluarga were also implemented in October and November 2021 respectively. The project was supported by Kementerian Pembangunan Masyarakat dan Kesejahteraan Rakyat. The 'Webinar for Nurses' was implemented in June 2022.

Providing Access to Reproductive Health Programmes/Activities.

The outreach activities were implemented in the estates, villages and peri-urban areas of Kota Kinabalu, Tawau, Lahad Datu and Kudat respectively. The marginalised women's group were screened for Pap smear and urine test. In addition, the information on sexual and reproductive health and rights related topics were disseminated for this group of communities.

Reproductive Health Services Project for Estate Workers and Families is a project supported by Sedane Labour Resource Centre (SLRC). It was implemented in the plantations and estates in Tawau and Lahad Datu respectively. There were several activities implemented for these group of communities such as awareness talks, general health check, deworming session for the children, Pap smear test and Hepatitis B screening.

Clinic Services

FReHA served 806 people and reached out to 362 new clients through the Yayasan Hasanah project. A Pap Smear Campaign which was a collaboration with Beyond Borders a Migrant and Refugee NGO.

In January 2022, FReHA was sponsored by CIMB Bank to provide fifty women with Pap smear services and to conduct awareness talks on the importance of cervical cancer screenings. Fifty women from the marginalised community especially women living with disabilities were reached out. This project forged partnership with NGOs who specifically work with people living with disabilities.

In conjunction with the International Women's Day on 8th March 2022, FReHA provided an online talk on cervical cancer and breast cancer to a group of 25 women. In collaboration with the domestic workers association, FReHA conducted quarterly online and physical talks to the members of the association.

FReHA collaborated with Malaysian Social Research Institute (MSRI) to provide sexual and reproductive health (SRH) awareness talks to a group of Somalia refugee women. A series of talks over 3 days were held reaching out to 30 women.

CSE for Refugee Teenagers (Penang Family Health Development Association, FHDA)

FHDA organized informal sessions to increase awareness and acceptance of family planning among the refugee community due to stigma and maledominant culture. The Myanmar Muslim refugee women from Arakan who live in Penang, mainly rohingya, were dependent on their men.

The community were vulnerable to teenage motherhood, lack of child spacing and required their husbands to lead them for health care. Maternal and women's healthcare were issues are of great concern. FHDA organised awareness talks during outreach to homes of refugee hosts. They used IEC materials, streamers, breast examination teaching model, toy dolls, laptop to give gender-based violence information, family planning and condom usage videos in Rohingya language. These were sourced from the International Catholic Migration Commission (ICMC) and Federation of Reproductive Health Associations, Malaysia.

Youth Road Tour 'Youth for Tomorrow' 3.0 (Reproductive Health Association of Kelantan, ReHAK)

In 2022, ReHAK once again collaborated with Kota Bharu District Health Office to conduct the Youth Road Tour 'Youth for Tomorrow' 3.0 programme in primary and secondary schools in the District of Kota Bharu. About 14 schools (5 primary schools and 9 secondary schools) were reached out through this programme. The activities include talk on adolescent's health, health screening and followed by small group discussions on topics such as puberty, reproductive organs, menstrual, safe and unsafe touch, HIV/AIDS, pornography, sexual violence as well as mental health. About 850 students, mainly standard 4, 5 and 6 and Form 1, 2 and 3 took part in the programme.

KPT Prihatin, Komuniti Sejahtera Programme (KRIS)

ReHAK also collaborated with O&G Department and Medical Social Work Unit, HUSM to run programmes for adolescents under the Ministry of Higher Education Grant called 'Program KPT Prihatin, Komuniti Sejahtera (KRIS)'. Programme with O&G Department was on the awareness of puberty and menstruation in children. The programme was held in 2 primary schools with Standard 3 until Standard 6 female school children. About 550 children were involved in the programme. The activities include group discussion on changes during puberty, menstruation and management of menstruation.

The children also were screened on their health and school children who had health issues were referred to HUSM.

Awareness Programme

ReHAK also collaborated with Medical Social Work Unit, HUSM in organizing an awareness programme called "Program Kesedaran Kesihatan Remaja Negeri Kelantan" on the 21 August 2022 at Dewan Besar Sektor Sumber Teknologi Pendidikan, Pengkalan Chepa, Kota Bharu. The participants were mainly the Form 6 students from schools in 6 districts in Kelantan (Kota Bharu, Bachok, Pasir Puteh, Tumpat, Machang and Tanah Merah). The programme aimed to raise awareness on the health, emotional, social and economy impact of child marriage, violence in a relationship and how to respond, teenage pregnancy, mental health and healthy lifestyle as well as promotion on the career as Medical Social Worker. ReHAK also took the opportunity to promote its youthto-youth club to the participants. About 100 students attended the programme. The event was divided into two sessions, the first session was allocated for the talks and the second session was the workshop. During the workshop session, students were divided into a few groups and each group were given a topic such as cyber-bully, child marriage, stress among adolescent, suicidal among adolescents and teenage pregnancy to discuss and present.

CSE Workshop

Besides school children, ReHAK also worked with strengthening the on delivery comprehensive sexuality education in schools. With the support from the High Commission of Canada in Malaysia through the Canada Fund for Local Initiatives (CFLI), ReHAK has partnered with Kelantan State Education Department and District Education Office has conducted a workshop on Strengthening Teachers' Capacity in Delivering CSE in Schools in 3 districts (Bachok, Tanah Merah and Machang). A total of 111 teachers attended the workshop and they have been reaffirmed on their knowledge of CSE which will give them the skills needed to deliver the subject in schools comfortably. The teachers also have increased awareness on procedures in handling and reporting abuse cases involving school children.



Due to this, many young people who are living with HIV (YPLHIV) often marginalized and afraid to seek out for testing, treatment, and support from people surrounding them.



Access to Sexual and Reproductive Health (SRH) Services for Refugees Living in Kelantan

In 3rd quarter of year 2020, ReHAK received a short-term grant from the UNHCR to run a project called "Access to Sexual and Reproductive Health (SRH) Services for Refugees Living in Kelantan". The project aimed at introducing sexual and reproductive health (SRH) in the form of medical/modern family planning method and improving access of services to the refugee population specifically Rohingya women in Kelantan. The short-term project started in mid-August 2020 and ended in December 2020. The project focused specifically in Kota Bharu subdistricts of Kadok and Melor.

The project has enabled ReHAK to expand their networking with a few new NGOs such as Malaysian Relief Agency (MRA) and IMAM Response and Relief Team (IMARET), who has been the key organization supporting the refugee population in the state.

On the other hand, they also encountered with a few challenges during the project. One of the challenges was the language barrier. Most of the Rohingya women not able to speak in Bahasa Malaysia or English, and only spoke in their dialect. For the project, ReHAK had to hire male interpreters as they could not find a suitable female interpreter, only managed to find female interpreter towards the end of the project.

During the project, they managed to approach 44 Rohingya married women (with consent) for brief personal profiling, and provided SRH clinical services such as pap smear, family planning method, breast examination and ultrasound to 39 women. ReHAK also provide basic medical check-up, for example, blood pressure and BMI. The project also supported 3 women for their deliveries. 5 women received awareness on SRH and access to services, however, they did not attend the clinic sessions. Apart from that, they also conducted two focus group discussions (FGDs) with the Rohingya women and one focus group discussion with local women. From the FGDs with the Rohingya women, they were able to identify issues regarding SRH, breastfeeding, children educational status and relationship with local women

KPT Prihatin, Komuniti Sejahtera Programme (KRIS)

ReHAK was invited by O&G Department USM to conduct 3 outreach programmes, with support from the Ministry of Higher Education Grant called 'Program KPT Prihatin, Komuniti Sejahtera (KRIS)'

The first outreach programme on "Kempen Saringan Pap Smear dan Cakna Kesihatan Wanita untuk Keluarga Bahagia dan Negara Gemilang" was held in Pulau Perhentian, Besut, Terengganu on 27 May 2022. About 150 participants attended the event. The activities include health screening, health talks, pap smear screening and consultation as well as exhibition. They managed to conduct 16 pap smears.

Another outreach programme with O&G Department on "Kempen Cakna Kesihatan Wanita & Keluarga" was held on 24 June 2022 at Masjid Tengku Aziza, Melor, Kelantan. About 240 participants attended the event. The activities include exhibition, health talks, general health screening, coloring contest for children, lucky draw as well as services such as pap smear screening, breast examination, ultrasound and family planning method were provided. During the campaign, they managed to do 19 pap smear screening, 5 implants and 3 IUCD insertion. They also had the opportunity to sell their pre-loved item as part of ReHAK's fund raising activity.

The event on "Projek Kesedaran Kesihatan Wanita" was held on 25 August 2022 and was attended by about 250 participants. The activities done were similar to the two previous events. ReHAK managed to do 26 pap smear screening during the event.

Differentiated HIV Services for Key Populations (DHSKP) in Malaysia

The DHSKP project funded by Malaysian AIDS Council (MAC) and Global FUND (GF).

The project aimed at providing differentiated HIV services to key populations in Malaysia. The focus of this project is on the targeted communities of female sex workers (FSWs) and men who have sex with men (MSM). Through tailored interventions, this project aimed to address the unique challenges faced by these populations in accessing HIV prevention, testing, treatment, and care services.

Through this project, FRHAM reached out to 1260 online clients, 299 face-to-face clients and 182 HIV/STI test were done, with the assistance of JEJAKA, the sub recipient of this project.






